We continue to deliver for young people. Through our amazing services we are impacting young people every single day. Last week our CEO Mark Russell sent a letter to the Immigration Minister enclosing a letter from the Youth Led Commission on Separated Children, calling on the Government to provide a guardian for every separated young person, attached to the letter was the petition signed by over 21,000 of our supporters who stand with those young people and demand change as part of our #DistressSignals campaign. This is a wonderful example of TCS amplifying the voice of young people to fight for change.

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

We Looked, We Listened, We Responded

The Department for Education funded national 'See, Hear, Respond' programme was delivered from June 2020 – March 2021 by a large consortium of children's charities, including TCS, Barnardos, Action for Children and a further 84 community based delivery partners.

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Who did we support?

Specific cohorts of children and young people included those under the age of five, children with special educational needs, children at risk of exploitation, children from black and ethnic minority backgrounds and refugee young people and young carers. The wide-ranging support provision included advice and support for families, particularly for parents, therapeutic support, responding to crisis needs, online

group work aiming to reduce isolation and manage stress and wellbeing, detached street based youth work and support for young people with reintegration into education. Notably the underlying need across all of the young people and the type of support provided was in response to the poor and rapidly declining mental health needs of young people.

How did we support those in need?

Our Programmes across England worked incredibly hard and a total of 5059 children and young people received support from TCS through the programme. They were predominantly over 11 years old with significant mental health and anxiety needs, BAME young people, young refugees, young carers, those at risk of exploitation and those in need of crisis support.

Our ways of working included digital therapeutic, crisis, group work and reintegration to education support for young people across England. The digital response enabled us to reach and respond to young people in crisis outside of the normal geographies and regions of our programmes of work. By triaging flexibly across our programmes we responded holistically to the needs of young people and were able to tailor packages of support from across our diverse and multiple range of services.
